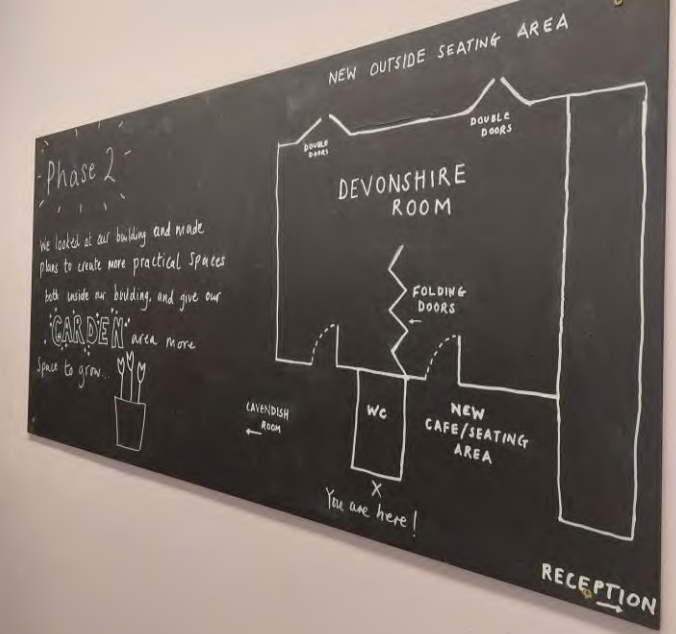

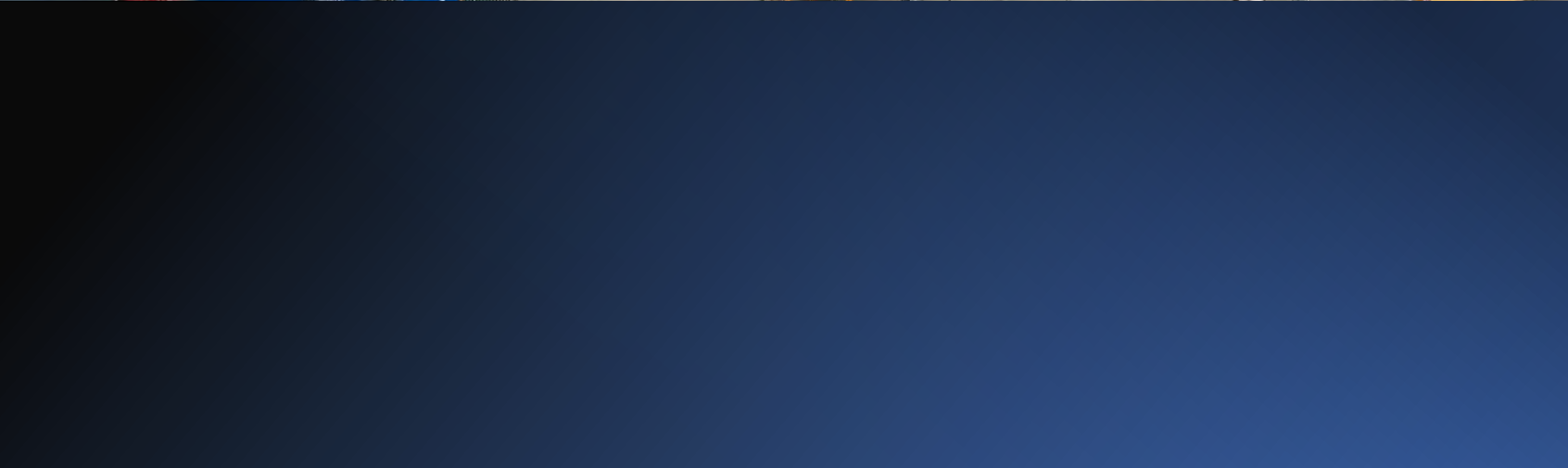

- "The roof restoration will ensure that this historic building will still be available to the people of Haworth for many years to come and that a valuable community space will provide many opportunities for both families and organisations."





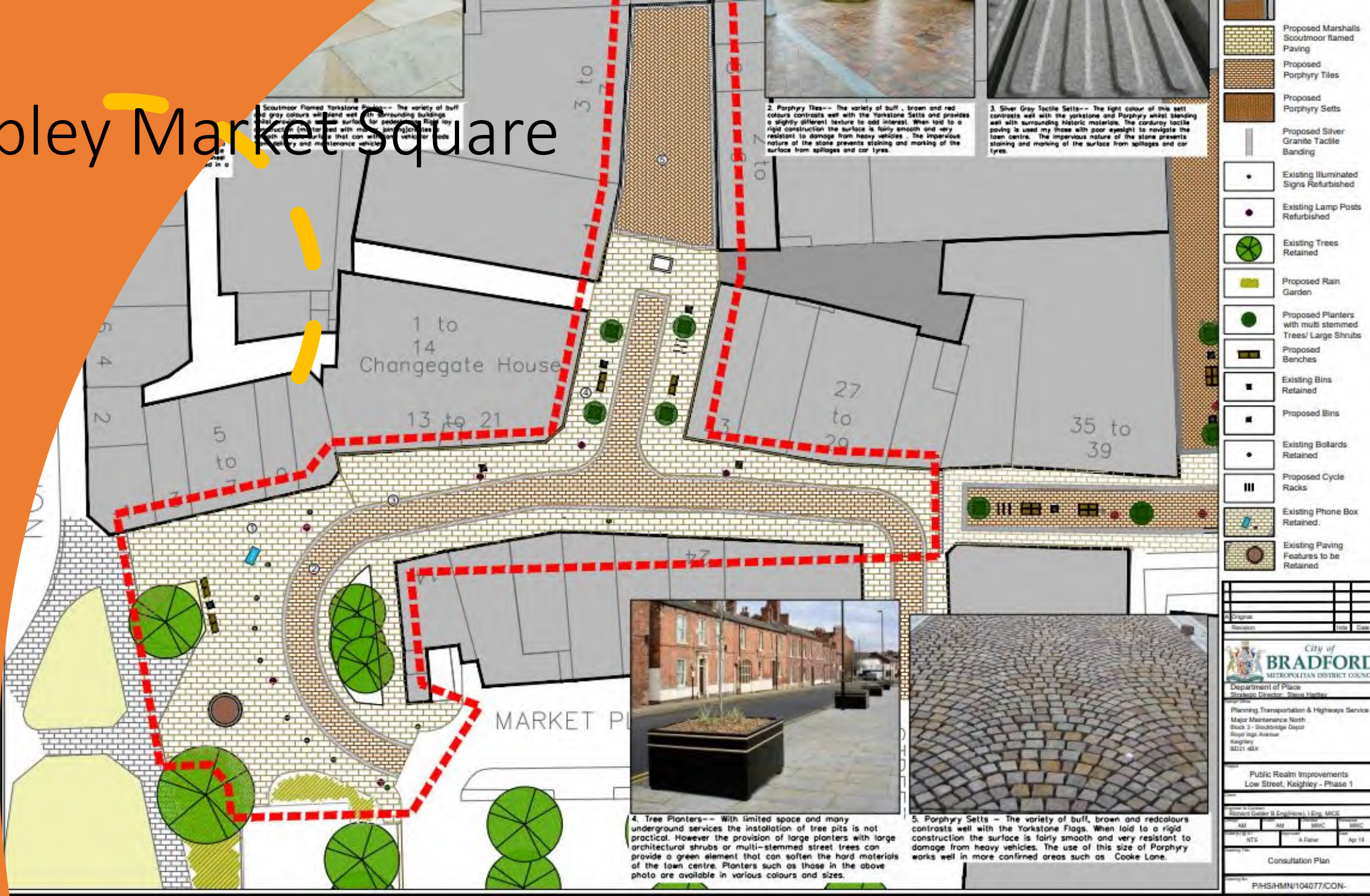

Scoutmoor Flamed Yorkstone Paving - The variety of buff and grey colours will blend well with surrounding buildings. The paving is laid with a slightly different texture to add interest. When laid to a rigid construction the surface is fairly smooth and very resistant to damage from heavy vehicles. The impervious nature of the stone prevents staining and marking of the surface from spillages and car tyres.

2. Porphyry Tiles - The variety of buff, brown and red colours contrasts well with the Yorkstone Setts and provides a slightly different texture to add interest. When laid to a rigid construction the surface is fairly smooth and very resistant to damage from heavy vehicles. The impervious nature of the stone prevents staining and marking of the surface from spillages and car tyres.

3. Silver Gray Tactile Setts - The light colour of this setts contrasts well with the Yorkstone and Porphyry whilst blending well with surrounding historic materials. The corduroy tactile paving is used in those with poor eyesight to navigate the town centre. The impervious nature of the stone prevents staining and marking of the surface from spillages and car tyres.

4. Tree Planters - With limited space and many underground services the installation of tree pits is not practical. However the provision of large planters with large architectural shrubs or multi-stemmed street trees can provide a green element that can soften the hard materials of the town centre. Planters such as those in the above photo are available in various colours and sizes.



5. Porphyry Setts - The variety of buff, brown and red colours contrasts well with the Yorkstone Flags. When laid to a rigid construction the surface is fairly smooth and very resistant to damage from heavy vehicles. The use of this size of Porphyry works well in more confined areas such as Cooke Lane.
